Hrair Sarkissian: The Other Side of Silence on view: 29.11.2022 — 14.05.2023.

Hrair Sarkissian's photographs often begin from seats of personal memory. One of the leading conceptual photographers of our time, Sarkissian engages critical subjects through meticulous research, developing intimate relationships to both site and object. Using a large-format camera, Sarkissian navigates and unfurls stories that are withheld from official histories and records. Blurring the lines between documentary techniques and choreography, the artist's large-scale works engage the viewer in a profound consideration of what lies behind the surface of the image, thus fostering a re-evaluation of political and social narratives.
